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SE bond sale to save taxpayers \$6 million

After months of legal battles, the Sibley East School District was able to sell the \$42,350,00 in bonds to finance the new building proj-

The bond sale took place on Wednesday, June 10 and the lowest bidder was Piper Jaffray & Company of Minneapolis at a true interest rate of 3.56 percent, .76 percent

lower than the 4.25 percent orignally estimated before the November election.

The lower interest rate prices will result in at least \$6 million in savings to district taxpayers.

The Sibley East School Board unanimously approved the sale of the bonds to Piper Jaffray and Company at a special meeting held Wednesday evening, June 10.

The tax impact for a home-

owner with a house valued at \$150,000 will be a \$237 increase per year, 19 percent lower than the \$293 increase estimated in the fall of 2014 prior to the election.

Homesteaded agricultural properties valued at \$500,000 will see the tax increase decline to \$511 per year, \$120 lower than the orignal estimate.

The increase on non-homesteaded agricultural land valued at \$5,000 per acre will decrease 19 percent from \$11.61 to \$9.40 per acre.

Commercial or industrial property tax impact on properties valued at \$250,000 will decrease from \$986 per year

The bonds can be refinanced after 10 years (2025) giving the district an opportunity for additional savings.

The bond market is just as volatile as any other financial market. Over the last year, the market was highest in July 2014 at 4.38 percent and at the lowest point on Jan. 16, 2015 at 3.29 percent.

The bond sale was orignally scheduled for Jan. 15, 2015, but was postponed due to an ongoing legal battle.

The sale will close on July 7. Sibley East will receive \$43,045,471.01. The money will be invested and have the opportunity to gain additional

interest on the investment.

The district will pay \$21,971,192.74 in interest costs over the 25-year life of the bonds at the current interest rates.

The Sibley East School Board will hold its next regular monthly meeting in Arlington at 6:30 p.m. Monday, July 20.

Arlington City Council approves purchase of new street sweeper

The Arlington City Council, during its regular meeting on Monday night, June 15, unanimously approved a motion to approve the purchase of an Elgin Pelican street sweeper from Mac Queen Equipment, Inc., St. Paul.

The cost, including an \$18,750 trade-in, will be \$162,897. The city received three bids overall. The street sweeper will arrive in August.

The City Council made the move after a recommendation from the Streets Committee which includes Streets Superintendent Tony Voigt and City Council members Jim Heiland and Galen Wills.

The City Council had budgeted \$180,000 in the Capital Improvement Fund for the purchase of the new street sweeper, according to City Administrator Liza Donabauer. It was purchased under state contract pricing.

Stop Sign

The City Council unanimously approved the installation of a stop sign at the intersection of Henderson Road

and First Avenue South. The City Council made the move after a recommendation from Police Chief Cory Dan-

ner and Voigt. Wills suggested that the city place a flag on top of the stop sign to draw attention to it. Since motorists will not be use to the new stop sign, Wills also suggested that the police department issue only warnings at that location for the first 60 days.

Mayoral Goals

The City Council members presented mid-year updates on six mayoral goals that were announced by Mayor Rich Nagel at the first meeting of the year.

The goals and the City Council members who were asked to follow each goal included (1) Begin the construction phase of the 2015 Street and Utility Improvement Project (Galen Wills), (2) Explore bringing new employment opportunities to the community (Jennifer Nuesse), (3) Continue to work toward platting the Industrial Park (Michelle Battcher), (4) Reduce the presence of blighted properties within the City of Arlington (Rich Nagel), (5) open access to a renewed Arlington Sportsmen's Park (James Jaszewski) and (6) Begin phase one of the sidewalk rehabilitation construction program (Jim Heiland).

The Sibley County Municipalities Association will hold its semi-annual meeting in Winthrop at 6 p.m. Thursday, June 18.

The entire City Council is expected to be in attendance for this meeting.

Clean Up Day

Donabauer announced that the City of Arlington Clean Up Day will be held at the Sibley County Fairgrounds in Arlington from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Thursday, June 25.

She reminded the City Council that Arlington residents must show proof of residency that day.

Other Business

The City Council unanimously approved a motion to approve an Emergency Operations Plan for the City of Arlington for 2015-2016.

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

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Judge sanctions attorney for 'frivolous' claims in tribal land dispute issues Congress set aside land re-

A judge has sanctioned a prominent Minnesota attorney for "frivolous" claims in a long-running dispute over tribal land, according to an article on the Minnesota Public Radio website. Attorney Erick Kaardal

represents a group of Mdewakanton Sioux who sought to oust a Native American tribe and several dozen landowners from 12 square miles in southwestern Minnesota, according to the article. Their ancestors sat out of the Dakota War in 1862, and

warding them for their loyalty. But that land was later turned over to tribal property. Joe Halloran said his

clients, the Lower Sioux Indian Community, are relieved that the case was dismissed, given all that it was seeking. "It would eject the tribe

and all of its members from the reservation homeland," Halloran said. "You can imagine it was pretty upsetting to the community and its members."

Chief U.S. District Judge

Michael Davis wrote this week that the claims were so frivolous "that they had to have been brought in bad faith," according to the article. He ordered Kaardal to pay for the defendants' attorney fees, which could amount to hundreds of thousands of

Kaardal didn't immediately return a call seeking comment, according to the article.

Kaardal has represented rural Gaylord resident Nathan Kranz in his matters with the Sibley East Public Schools.

4 motorcyclists are killed during 4-day period in Minnesota

Our View: Motorists are reminded to be extra alert to keep motorcyclists safe

Four motorcyclists have been killed in crashes within a fourday period around Minnesota, according to the Minnesota State Patrol.

With spring about to end and summer officially right around the corner, motorcyclists are out and about at an all-time high sharing the highways.

Over half of all motorcycle accidents are single vehicle crashes in Minnesota, according to the Minnesota State Patrol. Some of the primary factors involved in these crashes are driver inexperience, speeding, alcohol and no protection.

Nationwide, 25 percent of motorcycle operators killed in crashes are not licensed or are improperly licensed to operate a

Speeding, whether on a motorcycle or in an automobile, is always dangerous.

Driving a motorcycle also requires more skill and coordination than driving most other vehicles and impairment, even at lower levels, diminishes judgment and motor skills greatly.

Unlike automobiles, one reason motorcyclists are killed is that motorcycles provide virtually no protection. Nationwide, 80 percent of reported motorcycle crashes result in injury or death. A comparable figure for automobiles is only 20 percent.

Helmet use is extremely important since serious head injuries are common among fatally injured motorcyclists. Helmets are about 37 percent effective in preventing motorcycle deaths and about 67 percent effective in preventing brain injuries, according to statistics provided by the Minnesota State Patrol.

All motorists are also reminded to safely share the road with motorcycles and to be extra alert to help keep motorcyclists safe. In addition, motorcyclists are reminded to make themselves visible to other motorists.



Legacy – Passed

• Pro: Appropriates over \$300M in FY 16 and \$200M in FY 17 for Outdoor Heritage, Clean Water, Parks and Trails, and Arts and Cultural Heritage. These funds are constitutionally dedicated and generated from the three-eighths of one percent sales tax adopted from the 2008 constitutional amendment.

• Con: Continued government acquisition of land may put additional pressure on local governments due to the reduction in tax base and increases pressure on the general fund to provide local governments payment in lieu of taxes.

Jobs and Energy – Passed

• Pro: Enacts Rural electric coop disaster relief provisions comparable to Municipal electric power plants and appropriates money to a variety of state agencies such as the Departments of Employment & Economic Development, Housing Finance, Tourism, Labor and Industry and the Public Utilities Commission.

• Con: Spends \$391M from the General Fund which is \$18.5 million more than the bill vetoed by Governor Dayton.

Environment and Agriculture – Passed

• Pro: Repeal of the Citizens Review Board within the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency allowing a more business-friendly environment; Protections against penalties levied by the PCA for voluntary self-reporting; PCA and MMB cost analysis of water quality standard required; provides \$16.5M for avian flu response that has devastated the rural turkey and associated indus-

• Con: Provides 1.8 percent in-

creases across all agencies as recommended by the Governor.

Education – Passed

• Pro: Increases the per pupil base funding by two percent each year for a total increase of \$346.3M in per pupil revenue, an increase local school districts strongly supported.

• Con: \$1.4 billion increase over current biennium; significant increases in pre K school funding, an area that remains controversial as to its long term benefits, rather than a larger increase in per pupil formula as requested by local school districts; no equity funding reform (urban school districts receive approximately \$3,000 more per student on the general formula than rural schools); No significant policy reforms in the areas of teacher tenure, licensing, dismal graduation rates for urban schools or school choice.

Bonding – Passed

• Pro: Provides funding of \$373M in bonding, which is a fairly small sum considering Minnesota's overall bonding limits. Funding includes: disaster relief for the flooding that occurred in Minnesota in June 2014; Funding for a poultry testing lab in Willmar and a Veterinary isolation facility for the University of Minnesota in response to the avian flu crisis. Bonding authority for MnDot for local roads and bridges; Lewis and Clark Water Authority.

• Con: As is the case with all bonding bills certain projects that are arguably not of regional or statewide significance get included. However, in this bill such "earmarks" are for the most part absent.

As I have stated throughout the regular session, I am very uncomfortable with the drastic budget increases we have experienced over the last several sessions. The budget increased \$4.4 billion from FY12-13 to FY14-15 and will increase an additional \$2 billion between FY14-15 to FY16-17 for a total of \$41.8 billion. This increased rate of spending is unsustainable and detrimental to

Minnesota and its economy.

In addition, I am troubled by this special session and the way in which these final budget bills were created. During the regular session, the legislature went through the process of passing legislation that it felt balances the interests of all Minnesotans. As is his constitutional right, the Governor then vetoed certain spending bills at the end of session. However, without any corresponding constitutional authority, he then effectively assigned to himself the role of Chief Legislator and refused to call a special session to reconsider the vetoed bills unless the legislature agreed to his rewrite of the bills. With this game plan, he removed the entire legislature from the legislative process. There were no committee hearings or public input for the new versions of these budget bills. Members of the legislature had no opportunity to offer bills, amendments, input or otherwise represent their constituents because the legislature is powerless to act unless the Governor calls it into special session.

This "Chief Executive Legislative Process" would seem to be at a minimum, a violation of the spirit of the Separation of Powers doctrine and contradicts the constitutionally defined democratic process. Minnesotans are entitled to a republican form of government and that has not in full measure been provided to them during this special session. There are valid reasons why the Executive and Legislative branches of government are required to be separate. The more we allow those lines to be blurred, the less our Constitution is able to protect us from an overreaching government or chief executive. Gruenhagen provides updates on special session

To The Editor,

The legislature held our one-day special session Friday and into the early morning hours on Saturday to pass the budget bills vetoed by Governor Dayton and complete the 2016-2017 budget. I am disappointed that the Governor forced us into this situation by vetoing bipartisan bills. The Governor chose not to get involved in the legislative process until the very end, and tried to force his agenda through in a special session. Republicans stood strong against the Governor's demands and were able to pass real reforms that are going to be good for Minnesota.

The Jobs and Energy bill and the

Agriculture and Environment bill both respect taxpayers by cutting spending while still investing in Greater Minnesota priorities like workforce housing, broadband, and job training. It also provides muchneeded relief for avian flu. It also makes environmental permitting reforms that cut red tape and burdensome regulations. The Jobs and Energy bill includes unemployment assistance for laid off steelworkers on the Iron Range and poultry workers impacted by avian flu as well. I voted against the Education bill

because it simply doesn't do enough to promote school choice especially for low income and at-risk students many of whom are trapped in failing schools. It also doesn't include other reforms that will make a difference for the achievement gap.

I was also disappointed that it did not include the Safe Schools and Privacy bill which would have protected student privacy and required that bathrooms, showers, and locker rooms in a school be separated based on an athlete's biological sex. There is also a sales tax deferral in the education bill for our municipalities and counties. I am pleased that additional funding was included on

Dayton fights for a better outcome for MN

Minnesota DFL At the end of the 2015 legislative session, Governor Mark Dayton vetoed three bills because he knew they could be better. After the conclusion of the special session, we can appreciate Gov. Dayton's actions; his vetoes did improve the bills.

Because of Governor Dayton's leadership, Minnesota's E-12 education system will see an additional \$525 million in funding. Every classroom in the state will benefit from this funding. Governor Dayton was also successful in securing additional funding for early learning initiatives, English language learners and American Indian students.

The Governor's veto of the environment bill provided better environmental protections. In addition to securing landmark buffer legislation that will significantly improve water quality in rivers and streams by preventing pollution from entering our waters, Gov. Dayton fought against indefinite amnesty for polluters, weakening water quality standards and delaying essential environment re-

Under the jobs and energy bill, Gov. Dayton secured funding to help provide job opportunities for Minnesotans with disabilities as well as funding to help people with mental illness so they won't experience home-

While Governor Dayton worked with legislators to produce these positive outcomes, it's disappointing to know that with a \$1.9 billion surplus, legislators could have done so much more. Instead of building on the gains Governor Dayton and DFL legislators made for all Minnesotans during the last state budget, Republicans left almost \$1 billion on the bottom line in hopes of returning to the Capitol in 2016 to provide tax giveaways to corporations.

Republicans also failed to keep their campaign promises to residents of rural communities. While they ran on reining in government spending, not increasing taxes and having an understanding of "family budgets," they did the exact opposite. They passed the largest budget in state history, put \$30 million in tax increases into the education bill and refused proposals ranging from free preschool for all 4-year-olds to freezing college tuition that would have had a direct impact on middle-class families'

Newspapers in rural communities were not shy about calling out Republicans for their actions. In April, the Fargo Forum said, "They campaigned one way, but are legislating another." Days later the same paper reported, "The members of the Republican Majority, who campaigned on helping rural and small-city Minnesota, seem to have forgotten their promise." In May, the Rochester Post-Bulletin brought attention to the Republicans' action, calling it a "shameless divide-and-conquer strategy."

As legislators attend community events this summer, I encourage Minnesotans to let Republicans know citizens are setting high expectations for the 2016 session. With \$1 billion on the bottom line, they must fund the priorities most important to working Minnesotans and work with Governor Dayton and DFL legislators to create an even better Minnesota for all Minnesotans.


Thies finished a total score of 175 during the state classic.

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

"That should be a fun time with more piano, a little banjo music, and maybe a surprise or two," said Lehmkuhl.



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
