Special meeting set to accept resignation of a police officer

A special meeting has been set for the Arlington City Council to accept the resignation of police officer Scott Sandquist.

The special meeting will be held at 5:30 p.m. Monday, Jan. 29.

The City Council will also approve the police officer job description.

In addition, the City Council

will approve the posting of the police officer position.

Sandquist was hired by the City Council early last August and began his official duties later that month.

City of Buffalo asks Trailblazer for evening, weekend service

The Trailblazer Transit Joint Powers Board will have a year to consider a request from the city of Buffalo to provide evening and weekend service to its residents.

Gary Ludwig, Trailblazer's executive director, told the board at its Thursday morning meeting that Buffalo currently has its own program, but is considering eliminating it because of difficulty getting drivers.

"They asked if Trailblazer would consider picking it up as soon as possible," said Ludwig. He added that expanding weekend and evening service for transit is one of the Minnesota Department of Transportation's (MnDOT) goals.

John Groothuis of MnDOT's Office of Transit said that the earliest Trailblazer could offer the requested service would be 2019, as it needs to go through the MnDOT funding process first.

Ludwig noted that not only would Trailblazer have to find drivers, it also would

have to expand its dispatch service to evenings and weekends if it chooses to fulfill Buffalo's request.

"To be honest, it would be difficult," said Ludwig.

Kevin Kasel of the WCAT (Wright County Area Transportation) delegation to the board said that Trailblazer already has trouble finding drivers and dispatchers.

"The challenge is staffing ... it's always staffing," said Kasel. "If we can solve that issue then, yeah ..."

Sibley County Commissioner Bill Pinske reminded the board that this is not the first time that a city has requested expanded service — the city of Hutchinson also has asked about service.

"If we get it (Buffalo) in, then Hutchinson will be there for sure," said Pinske. "We need to get our driver situation resolved first before we branch out."

McLeod County Commissioner Doug Krueger said there are other models of transit that Trailblazer could look at for providing expanded service, citing the city of Marshall as an example.

The board agreed to take

the matter under advisement.

In other business, the Joint Powers Board:

- Elected McLeod County Commissioner Joe Nagel as its chair for 2018. Wright County Commissioner Darek Vetsch is the vice chair, and Pinske is the recorder.

- Reviewed the third-quarter expense and revenue report from 2017, as well as ride statistics. Ludwig said that 2017 will likely end with an excess revenue balance. "The numbers look really fantastic," he said. Trailblazer is expected to finish 2017 with 250,000 rides, up about 18,000 over the previous year.

- Heard that its job offer for its open operations manager had been declined by the candidate. Ludwig said the human resources director is looking at other options for recruiting candidates.

- Heard some ideas for providing service to low-rider areas from Sibley County Commissioner Jim Swanson, who asked the board to keep the issue on the table in future meetings.

King of Norway honors Jeff Mueller

King Harald V recently conferred Norway's highest honor on Arlington native, Jeff Mueller.

Mueller was presented with a Knighthood in the form of Officer Knight First Class in the Royal Norwegian Order of Merit. The Order of Merit, instituted in 1985 by the late King Olav V, is the highest honor Norway can bestow upon a foreign national. The award was presented in a ceremony at Norway House on Jan. 13, by Norway's Ambassador to the United States,

Hon. Kare Aas. The award is in recognition of more than 40 years of work and support of Norwegian business, cultural, education, governmental and military interests.

Mueller has been involved with Norway since his college days at Augsburg University and has previously held leadership positions in the Norwegian American Chamber of Commerce and has been involved in the annual U.S./Norway troop exchange program (NOREX) between members of the Norwegian

Home Guard and the Minnesota National Guard.

Mueller is currently Director of Operations at Norway House in Minneapolis, the National Norwegian Center in America. He also serves as Vice President of the City of Robbinsdale Charter Commission and is actively engaged in serving his community. Mueller is a 1972 graduate of the Arlington-Green Isle High School and son of the late Robert and Lorraine Mueller.

Northland Drying, LLC set to begin production by Thursday, March 15

A private group of owners plan to begin production at Northland Drying, LLC, in Arlington by Thursday, March 15.

Northland Drying purchased the entire former Seneca Foods property south of the railroad tracks for the new business in September of 2017.

While not much has changed on the exterior of the buildings, the interior of the buildings are undergoing major renovations and upgrades to house the new production equipment along with warehousing, shipping, receiving and main office space. External upgrades and continued expansion will begin as weather permits this spring.

Vos Construction, Green Isle, has been selected as the general contractor for the entire renovation project. The

local construction firm has been able to meet several demanding timelines to date, and has provided many local skilled subcontractors for portions of the work.

Northland Drying will be drying high moisture vegetable products into a dry, storable, transportable product that is suitable for use as an ingredient in pet and animal foods.

Northland plans to initially hire anywhere from 20 to 30 employees. The new hires will include a facilities manager, office staff, maintenance shift supervisors, operators, shipping and receiving and cleaning employees. These positions will receive a combination of salaries and hourly wages and be scheduled over three shifts. It is the intent of the owners to hire locally.

The ownership had opportunities to locate in other communities, but chose Ar-

lington because of its small town appeal, railroad access, a very cooperative city and county administration and assistance from city officials, Planning & Zoning Commission and Economic Development Authority (EDA).

Northland has a desire to continually expand the business into other adjacent markets and products and also made a selection of Arlington based on the room with which they can expand, but yet still remain at the heart of the city.

Northland will be offering an open house at a yet to be determined time once renovations are completed for those people who are interested in learning about what the business does or just to see the change of the former Seneca facility. It is the owners' hope that residents of Arlington see Northland Drying as a local business in which everyone can take pride.

Local residents given winter snow reminders

County Board discusses data request charges

The Sibley County Board, at its regular meeting on Tuesday morning, Jan. 23, discussed whether or not to begin charging for data requests regardless of the delivery format.

According to Sibley County Administrator Roxy Traxler, the County fee schedule states that the county will charge 25 cents per page. She stated that some offices are charging for faxed and emailed documents and some are not. According to the Data Practices Act, all government data can be inspected, and then can be charged for copied/scanned documents regardless of the transmittal form. If the request is under 100 pages, the rate is 25 cents per page, over 100 pages the County could charge at staff time rates.

Traxler stated the request had been made to begin charging because some of the data requests are taking an extensive amount of time and taking the staff members

away from other work that could be done.

County Commissioner Bill Pinske stated that this should have been cleared up at the fee schedule meeting.

County Commissioner Bobbie Harder suggested that staff begin keeping track of the amount of time that is spent on data requests. Traxler will add this to the next department head meeting for more discussion.

Contract

The County Board approved using \$12,000 to hire an intern or interns to work in Community Development.

According to Traxler, the interns will be paid \$12 to \$16 per hour. This will give Sibley County 700 hours of intern time to work on projects in Community Development.

Appointments

The County Board approved the following appointment to the Sibley County Planning and Zoning Commission: Bruce Froehlich was

appointed to the Planning and Zoning Commission 2018-2020; Darrel Mosel, Marlin Rose, and alternate Jack Smith were reappointed to the Planning and Zoning Board of Adjustment Members; and Bruce Froehlich was appointed to the Planning and Zoning Inspection Committee.

WIC Clinic

The Sibley Board approved a contract with Carmen Patino to assist Sibley County WIC clinics as a WIC Competent Professional Authority (CPA). Patino is estimated to work 40 hours per month at \$30.84 per hour.

According to Sibley County Health and Human Services Director Patino is needed until Public Health and Human Services is able to fill their RN open position and funding will come from WIC. Patino serves in this position for McLeod County.

Other Business

The County Board accepted \$4,504.42 in donations.

Most items sold at SE auction in Gaylord, nearly \$18,000 was raised at the event

Approximately 250 to 300 people attended the Sibley East auction in the former Sibley East Junior High School in Gaylord on Saturday, Jan. 20.

Most of the items sold at the auction, according to Sibley East Superintendent Jim Amsden. Sibley East received \$17,867.43 in proceeds after paying commission and advertising fees, he added.

"Overall, the event went

very well," said Amsden. "Almost all items brought some type of bid. Buyers have been removing purchased items this week and almost all the items are now out of the old Gaylord site.

Belle Plaine residents to vote on proposed \$33 million community center in 4 months

Belle Plaine residents, in less than 4 months, will be asked whether or not they will support spending \$33 million to build a new community center, according to an article in the *Belle Plaine Herald*.

In the meantime, Belle Plaine Superintendent Ryan Laager and school district staff are ramping up efforts to provide residents with the information they need to make an informed decision.

A community meeting will be held at the Oak Crest Elementary School at 6 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 13.

How much will the community center cost? According to Laager, the tax impact on a \$200,000 home would be \$186.61 per year or \$15.55 per month.

The 119,000-square foot facility will include a fieldhouse with four basketball courts; a running court and an elevated

walking track; a 2,700-square foot senior space; an indoor aquatic center with a lap pool, zero depth pool, water slide, and a 95-degree therapeutic pool; an outdoor aquatic center with a zero depth pool, diving space, water slides and other features; a youth room for parties, a weight room; classroom, multi-purpose room and concessions.

Snowstorm hits Arlington-Green Isle area

Minnesota Vikings have been disappointing their fans in big games for decades

Our View: The ugly loss to Philadelphia should have been no surprise

The Minnesota Vikings football team has ripped the hearts out of their fans in big games for decades. It all started when the favored Vikings were upset by the Kansas City Chiefs 23-7 in the Super Bowl during the 1969 season.

Three more Super Bowl losses followed to the Miami Dolphins 24-7 during the 1973 season, Pittsburgh Steelers 16-6 during the 1974 season and Oakland Raiders 32-14 during the 1976 season.

Long time Minnesota fans will argue that the best Vikings team up to that time never even made it to the Super Bowl. The Dallas Cowboys shocked the Vikes 17-14 on a Hail Mary Pass from quarterback Roger Staubach to wide receiver Drew Pearson in the divisional playoffs during the 1975 season.

A 23-6 loss to America's Team followed in the conference championship two years later.

Since that time, losses in other conference championship games have kept the Vikings out of five more Super Bowls. Minnesota lost to the Washington Redskins 17-10 during the 1987 season, Atlanta Falcons 30-27 in overtime during the 1998 season, New York Giants 41-0 during the 2009 season. The pair of overtime losses really hurt.

Viking fans will never forget when kicker Blair Walsh missed a routine field goal attempt in a 10-9 playoff loss to the Seattle Seahawks just two years ago. Another big game and another loss.

The latest disappointment occurred when Minnesota was toppled by the Philadelphia Eagles 38-7 during the conference championship game last Sunday night. It was not just the loss, but the thumping that hurt the Vikings fan base which has been aching for another return to the Super Bowl.

The quarterback situation needs to be figured out, but the pieces are otherwise in place for this young team to go deep into the playoffs again next season. The loyal Vikings fans have nothing to do but sit back and wait for next year.

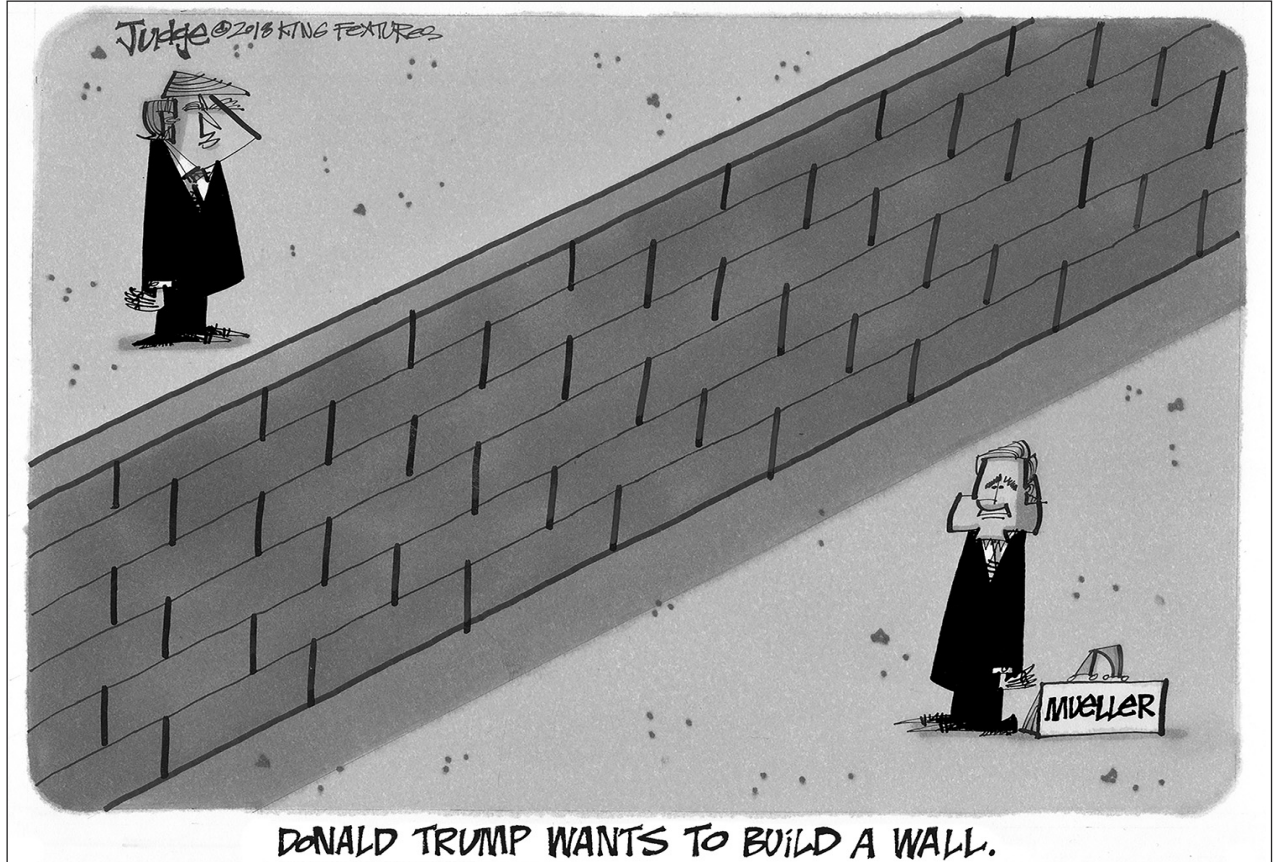

Legal battle brewing at State Capitol in St. Paul

To The Editor,

Earlier this month, former Lieutenant Governor Tina Smith was appointed by Governor Dayton to replace Al Franken as Minnesota's new United State Senator. Senator Smith will seek re-election in November to serve out the remainder of Franken's term.

There is no disagreement that the Minnesota Constitution gives the Governor the sole power to appoint a new U.S. Senator if the seat is vacated. However, there is a legal battle brewing over who will be our next lieutenant governor.

The Minnesota Constitution states that the president of the Minnesota Senate "shall" move into the role of lieutenant governor if that seat is vacated. The current president of the Minnesota Senate is Republican State Senator Michelle Fischbach.

Senator Fischbach has stated that she intends to accept the job of lieutenant governor, but that she also plans to remain in her seat in the Senate.

A memo prepared by Senate Counsel cited an 1898 ruling from the Minnesota Supreme Court that allowed the Senate president to also serve as lieutenant governor at the same time. In fact, this scenario has happened two other times in state history, in 1929 and 1937.

It appears that this issue will be resolved in the courts as just last week, a constituent of Fischbach's filed a lawsuit against her citing another provision in the constitution that states: "No senator or representative shall hold any other office under the authority of the United States or the state of Minnesota...If elected or appointed to another of-

fice, a legislator may resign from the Legislature by tendering his resignation to the governor."

Republicans currently hold a 34-32 majority in the State Senate and with a special election set for February 12th in Senate District 54, that majority could be reduced to a single seat. With this in mind, if Senator Fischbach were to resign, majority control of the state senate would hinge on the special election to replace her.

As you can see, this is setting up to be quite the legal battle. Stay tuned for more information on how this plays out and what it means for control of the state senate.

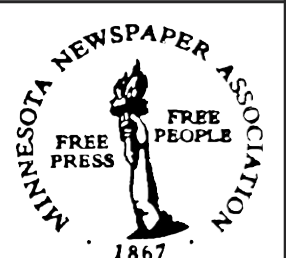

DNR offers opportunities to learn how to hunt turkeys this spring

Youth and adults can learn to hunt turkeys this April with experienced volunteers who will cover safe hunting techniques, how to call-in turkeys, hunting tactics and field dressing a bird, according to the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources.

"We teach the skills and techniques that allow new turkey hunters to become lifelong hunters," said Mike Kurre, learn-to-hunt program coordinator with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. "This has been a successful program and as a bonus, we love hearing how former participants go full circle to teach others how to hunt."

Participants can apply through Monday, Feb. 12. The hunts are Saturday, April 21, and Sunday, April 22, and provide opportunities to access locations that may otherwise be closed to hunting.

"We get volunteers from the National Wild Turkey Federation and this is the 16th year we've cooperated for these hunts," Kurre said. "Over the years we've introduced more than 5,000 people to these hunting experiences. We also work with the Minnesota National Guard to get military adults and their families into turkey hunting."

Details about how to apply and costs to participate are available at

mndnr.gov/turkeyhunt.

A pre-hunt orientation is required and all participants will need to have a valid firearms safety certificate or its equivalent. Youth must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

Overall participation in the hunts is restricted by the number of volunteers and private lands that are available. FSA Matters

Enrollment Open

The Sibley County USDA Service Center is actively accepting annual farm program contracts from farmers in Sibley County. While producers have until as late as August 1st to enroll for 2018 coverage under ARC and PLC it is something that can be removed from the annual to-do list much sooner than that. If there aren't any major changes to the way individuals or entities are operating their land, or changes to ownership, early enrollment can significantly speed-up the certification process to come later in the year. Farmers interested in enrolling should either contact the local Farm Service Agency (FSA) Office or just stop in at our new location to sign up. Now is a perfect time to complete enrollment and avoid the long lines to come.

Conservation Reserve Program Maintenance Required

On behalf of the Sibley County Farm Service Agency Committee, I would like to thank our many participants for participation in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). CRP is the nation's largest and most successful voluntary conservation program devoted to safeguarding environmentally sensitive land. Participant's willingness to enroll acreage into CRP with resource conserving vegetative cover demonstrates an interest in improving and protecting our nation's precious resources. With a continually growing number of landowners participating in the CRP in Sibley County it is important that participants maintain the vegetative cover.

While it may seem hard to believe, spring is just around the corner and with it comes added responsibility to eliminate volunteer trees and control noxious weeds on all land enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program. If you plan to mow your CRP to control weeds don't forget to contact your local Farm Service Agency Office. Mowing or chopping must be completed outside the primary nesting season in order to protect wildlife. The primary nesting season in our area of Minnesota is May 15th through August 1st. While everyone with CRP is responsible for maintaining the vegetative cover on an annual basis according to their contract all CRP contracts also require completion of at least one Mid Contract Maintenance Activity during the lifetime of the contract.

Landowners with Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) contracts are required to apply mid-contract management practices to their

CRP land including mowing, disking, burning, or inter-seeding to help establish plants and to assure an early successful plant growth stage. Managing plant communities is beneficial if not essential for less mobile animal species. The less mobile the species of wildlife, the more important it is to provide all the lifecycle habitat requirements for multiple species in a small area (songbirds, quail, and pheasants). Methods used will be designed to maintain soil and water quality criteria. Landowners are not required to annually apply mid-contract management practices, but they must complete one prior to the sixth year of a ten-year contract and prior to the ninth year of a fifteen-year contract.

As the technical service provider the Natural Resource Conservation Service is responsible for creating a conservation plan and working with landowners to provide guidance and set up management practices. The conservation plan signed by the participant prior to contract approval contains information regarding when and what type of activity will be completed for Mid Contract Maintenance. The NRCS Standards and Specifications will be used to apply mid-contract management options. The USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) can provide up to 50 percent cost-share for the completion of prescribed management activities including: mow, burn, disking, tree release, and others according to a CRP conservation plan.

There is always a lot of focus on the current rental rates and annual payments available through the CRP program. It is equally important that we remember that CRP participants hold a contract that requires maintenance and upkeep in order to ensure compliance. Letters have been sent out to participants required to complete a Mid Contract Management activity on CRP contracts administered in Sibley County this fiscal year. CRP participants with questions about maintaining acreage enrolled in the program should contact either the Sibley County Farm Service Agency Office or the local Natural Resource Conservation Service.
