Arlington to advertise for new police chief

The Arlington City Council, during a special meeting on Monday night, June 26, voted 4-0 and approved a motion to re-post for the police chief position with the new salary schedule.

City Council members Michelle Battcher, Tom Hatlestad, Jim Heiland and James Jaszewski all voted in favor of the motion.

City Council member Adam Cowell had a prior

commitment and was unable to attend the meeting.

Prior to that move, the City Council voted 4-0 and approved a motion to approve changes to the police chief salary scale.

Under the changes, the salary scale will decrease from 13 steps to four steps which will be similar to the City of Gaylord and City of Henderson. The salary will be \$68,000 the first year, \$71,500 the second year, \$75,000 the third year and

\$78,500 the fourth year.

The police chief hiring schedule will be fairly aggressive, according to City Administrator Liza Donabauer.

The position will be posted immediately and the application deadline will be at 5 p.m. Wednesday, July 12. A review of applications and narrowing of candidates will occur on Monday, July 17. Applicants selected for interviews will be contacted on Tuesday, July 18. The first round of inter-

views will be held Wednesday, July 26 while the final interviews will be held on Tuesday, Aug. 8. A tentative offer will be extended on Wednesday, Aug. 9. A background investigation will be initiated after this point with an appointment during early October. The hope is to have a new police chief in place by early November.

Interim Chief

The City Council voted 4-0 and approved a motion to ap-

point Sibley County Chief Deputy Pat Nienaber as the interim police chief effective Thursday, June 29. Nienaber will provide services at an administrative level until a new police chief is hired. He will also assist with the police chief hiring process and perform the background investigation. The cost will be \$1,700 per month.

Salary Scale

The City Council, in other news, voted 4-0 and approved

a motion to approve changes to the police officer salary scale.

Under the changes, the salary scale will decrease from 13 steps to four steps and match the City of Gaylord. The wage for a police officer will be \$22 per hour the first year, \$24 per hour the second year, \$26 per hour the third year and \$28 per hour the fourth year.

Arlington City Council votes 3-2 to allow off-sale Sunday liquor sales

The state ban on off-sale Sunday liquor sales in Minnesota is coming to an end on Sunday, July 2.

It is also coming to an end in the City of Arlington.

The Arlington City Council, during its regular meeting on Monday night, June 19, voted 3-2 and approved a motion to “opt in” to the new off-sale Sunday liquor sales law and allow local liquor establishments the opportunity to be open and sell off-sale liquor on that day of the week.

City Council members Michelle Battcher, Adam

Cowell and James Jaszewski all voted in favor of the motion.

City Council members Tom Hatlestad and Jim Heiland voted against the motion.

Prior to that motion, Heiland made the motion and Hatlestad made the second for a motion to leave the current ordinance to prohibit off-sale Sunday liquor sales unchanged, but include language to state the City of Arlington “opts out” of the new off-sale Sunday liquor sales law.

The motion failed by a 3-2 margin.

Hatlestad and Heiland voted in favor of the motion.

Battcher, Cowell and Jaszewski voted against the motion.

The City Council, prior to both motions, reviewed comments from community alcohol vendors in regard to the new state law. The comments were lukewarm. One owner said it would depend on the license fee. Two other owners said they would favor off-sale Sunday liquor sales only if their competitors are open on Sundays.

Prior to both motions, City Attorney Ross Arneson, on advice from the League of Minnesota Cities, encouraged the City Council to make a positive comment and either

opt in or opt out of the new state law.

Although the current ordinance still prohibits off-sale Sunday liquor sales, Arneson said local liquor establishments will still be able to operate under the new state law until the City Council can hold a first and second reading of an amended ordinance on the issue.

Under the new state law, liquor retailers can open their doors from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Sundays. However, nothing is forcing store owners to open on Sundays.

Sheriff’s department to provide police services in the City of Arlington

City Council votes 3-2 for original alleyway drainage improvement

The Arlington City Council, during its regular meeting on Monday night, June 19, voted 3-2 and approved a motion to approve the engineer’s original alleyway drainage improvement alternative as part of the 2017 Street & Utility Improvement Project.

The alternative includes the alleyway drainage reconstruction just north of the Arlington United Methodist Church.

The alleyway drainage reconstruction will now include the paving of the entire alley and the installation of two catch basins to alleviate drainage issues.

City Council members Adam Cowell, Jim Heiland and James Jaszewski voted in favor of the motion.

City Council members Michelle Battcher and Tom Hatlestad voted against the motion.

In a related move, the City Council voted 3-2 and adopted a resolution to approve an assessment for the original alleyway drainage improvement alternative.

Cowell, Heiland and Jaszewski all voted in favor

of the resolution.

Battcher and Hatlestad voted against the resolution.

Under this resolution, the assessments for the alleyway drainage improvement alternative will decrease from 100 percent to 25 percent for affected property owners.

The City Council, under a recently approved policy, was allowed to reduce the assessments to affected property owners if it determined the alley is a direct benefit to the general public.

The move made at the regular meeting on June 19 was in sharp contrast to the move the City Council made at its regular meeting on Monday night, May 15.

The City Council, at the regular meeting on May 15, voted 4-1 and adopted a resolution to add a storm sewer drain and leave the area as a gravel alleyway.

In other news at the regular meeting on June 19, the City Council voted 5-0 and approved a motion to deny the elimination of the sanitary sewer and water services on the empty lot located northeast of the Arlington United Methodist Church.

Trailblazer Board reaches consensus on new joint powers agreement

The three entities who comprise Trailblazer Transit came to a consensus Thursday morning on a new joint powers agreement.

That agreement will now go on to the governing boards of three entities — McLeod County, Sibley County and Wright County Area Transportation (WCAT) — for approval. If all three approve the agreement, it will go into effect Jan. 1, 2018.

The primary two issues the Trailblazer Joint Powers Board came to agreement on Thursday morning were the membership of the board and the split of local share costs.

The board agreed to have two representatives on the

Joint Powers Board from each of the three entities. In WCAT’s case, that may include one non-elected official, such as a city administrator.

The board spent a great deal of time discussing how the local share of cost — the expenses not covered by federal or state dollars or revenue — would be split among the three partners.

The joint powers agreement, drafted by attorney Frank Madden, proposed an equal split among the three partners, meaning each would contribute a third of the cost.

The board members, however, said they had expected a share split based on ridership.

“I thought we were going to that ridership piece,” com-

mented Joe Nagel, a McLeod County commissioner. Nagel said the understanding was that ridership would be reviewed annually, and the local share costs would then be determined.

Madden said that the equal split proposal was a temporary measure until Trailblazer came up with baseline of ridership to determine the share.

“The issue is, what do we do in the interim?” said Madden.

There also was debate about how to determine ridership. Trailblazer Executive Director Gary Ludwig pointed out that while some rides originate in one county, they may end in another. He also said there was a “fringe area” around the ridership area that

could not be assigned to any of three entities.

In previous discussions, it had been estimated that 45 percent of the ridership is in Wright County, 35 percent in McLeod County and 20 percent in Sibley County.

Ludwig said those estimates were made by “point of origin” for the rides, and still did not include the fringe areas.

After a great deal of discussion, it was decided to use that estimated 45-35-20 percent split as the initial basis for determining local share, and to leave the fringe rides out of the formula.

Complicating the matter was that Trailblazer is currently having a cash flow issue.

Ludwig said that Trailblazer needs a cash influx in order to make its July payroll obligations.

Bev Herfindahl of the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) said that the cash flow issue is temporary, as Trailblazer should be receiving scheduled payments from MnDOT and the federal government in the near future.

In the meantime, McLeod County will consider at its July 5 board meeting “floating a loan” of \$200,000 to cover the shortfall.

But that led to a discussion as to how future cash flow issues should be handled if McLeod County is not in a position to lend the money.

The hope is that with the

growth in Wright County, there will be enough excess revenue to cover temporary cash flow issues.

Madden said that now that the Joint Powers Board had come to a consensus on the agreement, he could work on drafts of other documents, such as personnel policies, bylaws and a job description for the executive director.

Scott Enter, a representative of WCAT, said that group intends to rescind the letter it wrote late last year indicating its desire to withdraw from Trailblazer if issues could not be worked out.

The board’s next meeting will be held in Buffalo at 9 a.m. Thursday, July 20.

Green Isle adopts two policies to be used as economic tools

The Green Isle City Council, during a recent regular meeting, took action on a pair of policies.

The City Council unanimously adopted a resolution to approve a Tax Abatement policy as prepared by Green Isle Economic Development Authority (EDA) Director Amy Newsom.

The City Council also unanimously adopted a resolution to approve a Tax Increment Financing policy as prepared by Newsom.

The City of Green Isle needed the policies in place to use as economic tools.

REV Grant

Newsom announced that she will apply for a Rural Entrepreneur Venture (REV) grant for strategic planning.

Newsom added that she would need a commitment

letter from the city and a representative from Green Isle to sit on a committee.

Mayor Joe Kreger and City Council member Diane Brown agreed to sit on the committee.

Planning & Zoning

Newsom also suggested that the City of Green Isle have a Planning & Zoning Committee.

She suggested that the EDA could be reduced to five people and three individuals could be on the Planning & Zoning Committee.

City Attorney Ross Arneson will draw up a rough draft for the ordinance that will address the Planning & Zoning Committee. The committee will include two citizens and one City Council member.

RS Fiber

Kreger reported that he had received many complaints from residents about the Renville Sibley (RS) Fiber lines that were still above ground. The lines were installed when the ground was frozen earlier this year.

Kreger contacted the RS Fiber office about the complaints and was told a crew would be in town the next day.

City Council member Shawn Harms commented that the internet service provided by RS Fiber is terrible. He said his family is "constantly being kicked off" the system at his house. Harms added that he wished the City of Green Isle had never gone with RS Fiber.

There was also a brief discussion that RS Fiber, after digging in the lines, does not leave the grassy area in good shape.

City administrator is let go in Gaylord

The Gaylord City Council, during a meeting on Monday night, June 26, voted 3-2 and approved a motion to terminate the employment of City Administrator Kim Moore-Sykes.

Gaylord Mayor Don Boeder and City Council members Tom Homme and Shawn Lasure voted in favor of the motion.

City Council members

Chad Muchow and Jessica Uecker voted against the motion.

City Council member Jim Landaas abstained from the vote. Landaas, who was not present at the review last week, was one of the top candidates for the city administrator position over six months ago.

The City Council made the move after it had conducted a six-month review of Moore-Sykes last week. That review

was kept open to the public at the request of Moore-Sykes.

Moore-Sykes was hired by the Gaylord City Council about six months ago. Her hiring came on the recommendation of interim City Administrator Rick Almich at the time.

There are no immediate plans on how to fill the now vacant city administrator position.

Arlington City Council
increases salary scale for
police chief and officers

Our View: It's a good move to attract
more quality chief candidates
and retain police officers

The Arlington City Council, during a special meeting on Monday night, June 26, unanimously approved separate motions to decrease the salary steps and increase the salary scale for the future police chief and the two police officers.

The move is good news on two fronts. First, the City Council listened to local residents at the recent public forum who said the City of Arlington should spend more money to secure quality law enforcement officers. Second, the City Council is now competitive with neighboring communities and the metro area when it comes to salaries for law enforcement officers.

The result is that the City of Arlington now should be able to attract a greater pool of police chief candidates. In addition, the City of Arlington now should have a better chance to retain its police officers in the future. It should be noted that there is currently one full-time police officer and it is expected that a second full-time police officer will be hired soon.

It all comes down to the old saying, “You get what you pay for.”

On a side note, the City Council made the correct move to break off talks about a consolidated police department with the City of Gaylord and move forward with the advertising for its own police chief.

First, it was the overwhelming message voiced by local residents at the recent public forum. Second, it would have been extremely difficult to consolidate two police departments when neither town has a permanent city administrator in place at the current time.

Commissioner comments on Sentence to Service

Sibley County enters into many contracts and agreements which provide a variety of services. The Sentence to Serve (STS) contract has garnered attention. This contract is renewed every two years. Here are some facts relating to the contract.

At the May 23 County Board Work Session, one of the topics discussed was the STS contract. The contract to be renewed is requesting a 6% increase each year. This equates to a total of 12% for the two years and the total increase to us of nearly \$9,932.00. The increase requested has an impact to our budget. Direction by the County Board was given to our County Administrator to find out what services are being provided and to explore what the costs would be if the contract was discontinued and the services completed by a county employee. This was to compare the costs of a state run versus county run program. The

County Board understands the benefits of the program. There was no discussion about discontinuing the program.

Listed in the STS contract, the State of Minnesota has a number of duties to fulfill. One of the requirements is to submit reports to the county. The reports shall include information such as a) Total number of offenders served b) Total number of offenders completing STS obligation c) Number of offenders exiting prematurely d) Total number of hours worked by STS workers e) Dollar benefit of STS labor at \$7.00 per hour and estimated market value of projects completed and f) Description of work completed. In the last two years, unless specifically requested, the state did not provide the information.

Due to the timeframe of when the STS contract is to be renewed, there is not enough time to complete a thorough analysis of comparing a state run versus county run program. The contract does state either party

may terminate at any time with or without cause, upon a 30-day notice. Due to the increasing costs of the STS contract or any other contract, at some point, evaluating the costs and effectiveness needs to happen. We can't afford to continue paying for increased costs without adequate justification.

As a County Commissioner, I have an obligation and due diligence to analyze, ask questions, and make decisions or provide direction based upon the facts for every item on the county board agenda and work session items. To cut off discussion because someone's feelings are hurt can be expensive to all of us as it affects our levy. With situations such as this one, it is difficult to keep our levy steady or lower than the previous year. In addition, when contracts require an increase for services and there is little to no room to negotiate, it affects the county's ability to fund other projects or requests.

First Children’s Finance have chosen Sibley County to participate in their Rural Child Care Innovation Program. The Rural Child Care Innovation Program is a community engagement process designed to address the challenges of child care in rural America. Close to 20 applications statewide were submitted and Sibley County was one of four communities to be selected.

The program is based on the fundamental idea that rural communities are greater than their size in numbers and greater than their current challenges. Where some might see desolate swaths of land and dwindling populations, the Rural Child Care Innovation Program sees opportunity for innovation and renewal. By mobilizing and empowering rural communities, the landscape of early care and education is changing in rural America.

Local analysis provided by First Children’s Finance shows that five cities in Sibley County have a shortage of child care providers with Arlington having the largest shortage of 134 slots; followed by Gibbon short 62 slots, Henderson short 54

slots, Winthrop short 24 slots, and New Auburn short 17 slots.

To help find a realistic child care solution, Sibley County has included community leaders from the schools, businesses, Public Health and Human Services, and child care providers to join the Rural Child Care Innovation Program Core Team. provider; Brandy Barrett, Green Isle Community School, Apryl Deno, Sibley East Childhood Coordinator, and Dana Lietzau, Gibbon City Administrator.

The Rural Child Care Innovation Program is a community engagement process designed to develop right-sized solutions to address the needs of child care and early education for communities selected to participate. Over an 18-month period, chosen communities will increase the focus on opportunities and challenges they are facing with child care. First Children’s Finance helps facilitate the conversation and provides expertise, tools and resources to support the creation and implementation of solutions to address child care shortages in rural communities. There are also potential grant monies available at the completion of this process to help communities implement the solutions.
