Soccer seeks elusive second win

It was another difficult week for the Glencoe-Silver Lake girls' soccer team as the Panthers went goalless in their last three games and have now failed to score in nine of their 13 games this season.

A home game against Hutchinson on Tuesday, Sept. 29, was particularly heart-breaking for the Panthers.

After more than 79-1/2 minutes of scoreless play, the Tigers tallied the breakthrough tally on a long arcing goal that soared into the GSL net with just 27 seconds remaining in regulation time.

"I thought that we played a

very well rounded game, coach Zach Otto-Fisher said. "We hustled, we communicated, were aggressive and took advantage of the rivalry game against Hutch – until the final 30 seconds of the game.

"There is no excuse for letting that Hutch player dribble 20 yards and get a clear-looking shot off on goal. We definitely had more positives than negatives in that game, but the one big negative led to that goal and a 1-0 loss."

It was as close to a draw that the Panthers would get.

Missing seven players for multiple reasons, GSL fell 8-0 at Wright County Conference-leading Orono on

Thursday, Oct. 1.

"The girls that did play did a nice job I thought keeping our formation and working out some kinks," Otto-Fisher said. "Orono is a freak powerhouse that won the state title last year. We surrendered four goals each half and only got two shots on goal ourselves. Not a good day."

It didn't get much better after the weekend as GSL – again missing several players – fell 5-0 to New Ulm in the final game of the season at Stevens Seminary Stadium on Monday, Oct. 5.

"In my opinion, I thought we were the more athletic team and had a lot of energy to start the game," Otto-Fisher

said. "With senior night there, we carried that emotion on the field, but gave up some easy goals that we didn't defend well."

The Panthers have one final regular-season game remaining this autumn, with the squad traveling to face Jordan at 7 p.m. Thursday. Jordan is 1-8-1 on the year, compared with GSL's 1-9-3 overall record.

"We need to regroup at practice and get a win on Thursday," Otto-Fisher said. "(Section) seeding takes place on Friday and a win over Jordan would put us at the 11 or 12 seed.

"Girls control their own destiny on this one."

Spikers nearing WCC West title

While the Glencoe-Silver Lake volleyball team's string of clean sweeps came to an end at seven matches on Monday, Oct. 5, at Gibbon-Fairfax-Winthrop, it only took one more game for the Panthers to defeat the Thunderbirds and improve their winning streak to eight matches.

GSL looked well on its way to a clean sweep at GFW, posting a 10-0 game in the first game before the hosts rallied for a 25-22 victory.

However, losing the opener only served to anger the Panthers, who roared to the match triumph with three consecutive game wins, 25-14, 25-5, 25-19, and improved to 19-4 overall in the non-conference matchup.

Outside hitter Taylor Novak and inside hitter Erika Novak shared the team lead in kills with 12 each. Setter Layne Herrmann was tops in set assists with 33; libero Emily Muetzel topped the squad with 24 digs.

"Emily continues to be disciplined and plays solid defense and does her job consistently well," coach Lori

Schwartz said.

The Panthers edged closer to winning the Wright County Conference West championship on Thursday, Oct. 1, with a three-game match win against Dassel-Cokato – 25-13, 25-10, 25-20 – on "Dig Pink and Senior Night."

"The gym was packed with a lot of fans and really a lot of great energy and atmosphere," Schwartz said.

Maddie Monahan and Herrmann shared the team kills lead for the contest with eight apiece, Herrmann also was tops in set assists with 27, while Ribar led the way with 16 digs.

The win gave GSL a 5-0 home record this season and a 4-0 mark in WCC West matchups. The Panthers, who are also 5-0 against competition from Section 2AA, controls its destiny with regards to winning the conference title.

GSL plays its final three conference games on the road, traveling to Watertown-Mayer on Friday in its lone matchup before the Rochester Ex-

GSL returns to winning ways vs. Chargers

Happy days are here again for the Glencoe-Silver Lake football team. The Panthers rebounded from their first loss of the season at Homecoming by winning 39-6 at Dassel-Cokato on Friday, Oct. 2 behind sophomore running back Carsen Streich's Herculean effort.

Streich posted the team's highest single-game rushing total of the season with 233 yards to go with three touchdowns in spearheading the GSL attack. The sophomore gave the Panthers the lead for good on a 3-yard score early in the opening quarter before buoying his stunning rushing total with touchdown sprints of 67 and 77 yards later in the contest.

"We had these expectations for Carsen," coach Scott Tschimperle said. "We knew he had ability to make big plays and now he's gaining confidence in what he's doing."

Tschimperle was quick to compliment the play of the Panthers' offensive line, which often did not appear up to the task in the previous week's home loss to Delano – pointing out the play of sophomore Joey Cullen, who start-

ed his first varsity game at center.

"A lot (of the win) had to do with line play and Carsen himself," the coach said. "Our linemen made key blocks in the game and Joey really made a nice block to spring Carsen for one of the long touchdown runs."

When Streich wasn't running rampant, junior Luke Frahm went about pushing the Panthers to a 32-0 lead with a pair of 2-yard touchdown runs – one coming in the second quarter, one in the third.

After the Chargers avoided the shutout with a touchdown to open the fourth quarter, running back Tony Lowden finished off the game's scoring with a 2-yard touchdown trot that brought the score to its eventual final 33-point spread.

Tschimperle agreed that the lopsided victory was just what the doctor ordered for any ails the Panthers experienced following the Homecoming loss and that Friday's result helped the team regain confidence as it waits for senior multi-back Teddy Petersen to return from a groin injury.

"It was a good way to re-

At Cokato's Collinwood Park for the Dassel-Cokato Invite, the Panther boys placed fourth while the girls took fifth. Michael Schaefer took fourth on the 5,000-meter boys' course with a time of

spond after the week before. I'm very pleased with how we performed and how the game turned out," the coach said. "When a team loses a player of Teddy's caliber, it affects overall performance. As for the prospective return of Petersen, it's still at least a few weeks off.

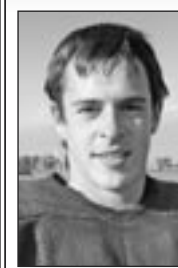
Section 2AAA playoffs.

"If win, we'll get the one seed. No question about that," Tschimperle said. "Don't know what's going to happen with Providence, but with a six-point QRF lead, we just have to take care of business."

Providence Academy is currently the closest to GSL in the QRF (Quality Rankings Formula) among 2AAA teams. The QRF is the main factor in deciding sectional seedings. The Panthers are ranked third in Class AAA QRF at 73.1, Providence is fifth at 67.1.

Provided GSL earns Friday's win and the sectional bye, it would host a 2AAA semifinal contest at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 20. A semifinal win has the Panthers hosting the section championship game at 3 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 24.
