

Win streak ends for GSL baseball after two losses

Just as the Glencoe-Silver Lake baseball team hit the high point of its season, the Panthers suddenly stumbled a couple times last week.

GSL opened its most recent three-game stretch by winning its ninth game in a row in a 5-3 victory at Mound Westonka on Tuesday, May 9, that avenged an earlier-season loss to the White Hawks.

However, the remainder of the stretch was not nearly as kind to the Panthers as the team suffered losses of 7-2 and 5-2 at Dassel-Cokato and Norwood-Young America, respectively, to close out the

The setbacks left GSL with a 12-4 overall record, 8-2 in the Wright County Conference West and 8-1 in games against fellow Section 5AA teams.

The Panthers opened this week still leading the WCC West by one-half game over New London-Spicer. GSL

Peyton Sell tossed a complete-game six-hitter in the Panthers' win over Mound Westonka.

Korey Johnson drove in three runs and scored once on a 3-for-4 day at the plate. Mitch Boesche also had three hits and one RBI, while Taylor Schauer and Alex Troska each had two hits and one run scored.

Dassel-Cokato, which lost 5-3 in Glencoe a month ago, earned the regular-season split with a 7-2 defeat of its visitors on Thursday, May 11. The Chargers put up three runs in the first inning to take a lead they did not relinquish.

Sell and Carsen Streich both took advantage of a succession of D-C errors to score GSL's runs in the fifth inning. Luke Frahm logged two of the Panthers' five hits, while Johnson took the completegame loss on the mound.



Pastor's Corner

Dr. Tom Rakow, Pastor Grace Bible Church, Silver Lake

t was a small prayer. It was a simple prayer. However, her request would require a supernatural answer.



Early that morning Grace prayed that we would not get any wood ticks. Now I have to tell you I thought (but didn't say it out loud), "Good luck with that! That is just not going to happen!" Yes, I knew that the Lord controlled flies and other small insects while the Hebrews were in Egypt (see Exodus 8), and that he even used a worm to accomplish His purpose with Jonah (Jonah 4:7).

Nevertheless, I already knew how numerous the ticks were. Furthermore, Grace's thick, long, dark hair would make her a virtual tick magnet.

We hunted in a variety of places that could aptly be considered wood tick heaven. Grace eventually harvested her turkey and carried it out slung over her shoulder.

but none were found. The next day I returned to hunt in the same area - and was once again back to picking off wood ticks. Years later I am still amazed at this little hunting miracle. On a few occasions I have even tried praying - but with no faith and even less success - to be spared from wood ticks. In the Bible Jesus promised, "If you believe, you will receive whatever you ask for in prayer (Matthew 21:22). That day through my daughter's simple, believing prayer, I was shown that God is even Lord of the wood ticks.

But to my utter amazement, not a single tick was found on either one of us. I just could not believe it! I kept checking myself all day long,





Results of Monitoring

No contaminants were detected at levels that violated federal drinking water standards. However, some contaminants were detected in trace amounts that were below legal limits. The table that follows shows the contaminants that were detected in trace amounts last year. (Some contaminants are sampled less frequently than once a year; as a result, not all contaminants were sampled for in 2016. If any of these contaminants were detected the last time they were sampled for, they are included in the table along with the date that the detection occurred.)

Key to abbreviations:

MCLG-Maximum Contaminant Level Goal: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.






